# Strategic Plan Goal 1: Deepen UCLA's Engagement with Los Angeles–partner for social impact

- "To meaningfully impact the lives of Angelenos, tap into the contributions and expertise of our region's communities, and partner with those communities to improve quality of life in the city."
- Commitment to measure and report on impact:
  - "Identify, collect and report on metrics that track the quality of the partnerships and impact of community-engaged research and creative activity, <u>with community partner input in the development of those metrics</u>.



# Social Impact Collaborative Grants as a strategy to advance Goal 1

- Build equitable and sustained relationships with Los Angeles partners
- Contribute to building a more equitable Los Angeles
- Partnerships for change and impact
  - To achieve these goals, the Social Impact Collaborative grant program asks all grantees to work with a theory of change.
- Interdisciplinary teams to bring multiple perspectives to complex issues



### **Social Impact Collaboratives – priority areas of focus**

 Issues related to post-fire recovery and rebuilding of lives and communities, including but not limited to fire- and climate-specific topics, housing, economic recovery, health and wellbeing, and attention to vulnerable populations.

 Community priorities identified by the UCLA LA Community Engagement Council (composed of leaders from Los Angeles community organizations and nonprofits, government, business, and foundations): Climate change, housing and homelessness, food insecurity, public safety and restorative justice, and community health and wellbeing



## **Social Impact Collaboratives – other priorities**

- Proposals that include early career faculty as Co-PIs (particularly for Exploratory grants) or on the research team
- Proposals involving researchers and/or partners with a history of successfully addressing equity and inclusion in their work
- Proposals that partner with under-resourced community organizations
- Proposals that include first generation college students and/or students with ties to communities affected by the equity issue that the research/creative activity seeks to address



### **Community-Engaged Research**

### Traditional Research CE: None or Low

### Community-Engaged Research

### **CE: High**

- Research "on" communities
- Process: <u>Unidirectional</u>, researcher directed
- Products: Scholarly articles with sole benefit to the researcher; limited direct applied benefit.

- Research "with" communities
- Process: Researcher & community partner are <u>equal partners</u>
- Products: <u>mutually</u> determined and beneficial to researchers AND community; Applied benefit is <u>central</u> to the partnership.





# **Theory of Change**

- A conceptual model for how change will happen
- An artifact that documents/articulates such a model, including along-the-way changes and longer-term goals

A theory of change articulates one's underlying beliefs and assumptions about why particular actions will contribute to the anticipated changes or new conditions

### **Overview of 3 Grant Categories**

# Exploratory Seed Transformative

#### Social Impact Collaborative Exploratory Grants (up to \$10,000):

This grant focuses on initial relationship building for starting a new collaborative team.

#### Social Impact Collaborative Seed Grant (up to \$50,000):

This grant will support a newly formed or existing interdisciplinary group working with a Los Angeles community partner(s) on an equity-advancing topic to conduct early-stage research and/or creative activity.

#### Social Impact Collaborative Transformative Grant (up to \$250,000 over 2 years):

Proposals at this level have successfully completed one or more interdisciplinary community-engaged research projects or creative activities, and now seek to expand their scope or scale of work, add new partners, or add a new dimension to their collaborative efforts.



### **Collaboratives to include:**

**Principal Investigators:** All proposals require a *minimum* of two Principal Investigators (PI) from different departments, and both must be UCLA Senate Faculty. One of the PIs must be designated as the Contact PI, who is responsible for receiving and coordinating communications on behalf of the Collaborative.

**Community Partner(s)** could include non-profit organizations, tribal or community organizations, governmental agencies, and if appropriate, for-profit entities. In all cases, community partners should be a recognized and credible entity respected for its work in the particular issue area.

Additional Team Members: UCLA faculty/staff/students who will be contributing to the collaborative (ladder faculty, lecturers, adjuncts, other non-Senate faculty such as academic administrators, visiting faculty, postdoctoral fellows, graduate and/or undergraduate students). In addition, individuals without UCLA appointments can join a social impact collaborative team. Additional team members should reflect the interdisciplinarity of the collaborative.



## **Exploratory Grant (\$10,000)**

- Interdisciplinary and community-engaged work
- Focused on social equity issue in Los Angeles (City or County)
- Community-Engaged Research/Creative Activity & Theory of Change
  - Relationship building phase-interdisciplinary research team with community partners
  - Co-construction of research question/creative activity plan
  - Collaboratively developing a <u>theory of change</u> for how the planned research/creative activity links to the partners' ongoing social change work



### Seed Grant (up to \$50,000)

- Interdisciplinary and community-engaged work
- Focused on social equity issue in Los Angeles (City or County)
- Community-Engaged Research/Creative Activity & Theory of Change
  - Early-stage research and/or creative activity.
  - Seed grants provide an opportunity to test how the research/creative activity collaboration enacts a <u>theory of change</u> to address an equity issue.
- Applicants must have established partnerships and an articulated theory of change.



### **Transformative Grant (up to \$250,000 over 2 years)**

- Interdisciplinary and community-engaged work
- Focused on social equity issue in Los Angeles (City or County)
- Community-Engaged Research/Creative Activity & Theory of Change
  - Expanding your scale of work, such as by adding new partners, or adding a new dimension to your collaborative efforts
  - *Transformative* both in equity-advancing outcomes and for knowledge-making (research, scholarship, creative activity)
  - At this stage, the Collaborative must be able to articulate how the research/creative activity collaboration contributes to a <u>theory of change</u> to address the equity issue.
- Applicants must have an established track record of community-engaged equity-focused research, with a theory of change and preliminary evidence of impact.



### **Fundable expenses**

### **Personnel:**

- **Community Partners:** Compensation of community partners is required.
- **Personnel:** Research assistants (undergraduate and/or graduate students).
  - Please note *Exploratory and Seed Social Impact Collaborative grants* do not fund faculty salary support of any kind, but *Transformative grants* can (one summer 9th per co-PI).

### **Travel expenses if needed**

Additional Expenses such as supplies and materials needed to support research/creative activity (planning for Exploratory grants)

## **Social Impact Collaborative Award Requirements**

**Faculty Learning Community:** Faculty representing all funded Social Impact Collaboratives will attend a series of meetings over the year bringing together all grantees in one broader learning community to:

- Explore points of convergence across research and creative activities on equity issues in Los Angeles
- Exchange learning and incorporate best practices on building and sustaining collaborative, interdisciplinary, community-engaged research teams
- Provide professional development with strategic communications and fund development
- Develop metrics for evaluation of impact

### **Reporting:**

- Streamlined Quarterly Progress Reports
- Final Report: A final report (progress narrative and financial report) must be submitted after the completion of the grant.
